Besides college football bowl games, New Year's Day is most closely associated with New Year's Resolutions. Starting a new year with a fresh calendar before us and maybe a new journal, too, we make plans—or rather make "wishes"—to do some things differently. We'll lose that extra weight the crept up over the years.

We'll quit a bad habit. We'll begin an exercise program and join a gym (gyms love this resolution because they know it is "easy money" and this resolution seldom makes it to Easter but the monthly fees continue!) We decide to take a class or spend more time with our families or mend a broken relationship. All with good intentions, but in the words of Mary Poppins, they are often nothing more than "pie crusts promises; easily made and easily broken". (It strikes me that only Mary Poppins found pie crusts "easily made"!) What we are really wanting to do is embed new habits in our lives.

I've been doing a lot of research on habits and here are a couple of key things that I learned. It is not strictly a matter of will-power. You have to replace one habit with another because a basic law of life is that nature abhors a vacuum. Secondly, if the new habit is too large, hard or overwhelming, it will not last. Start small. One recent podcast used the example of flossing your teeth. If you want to get in the habit of flossing your teeth start with just flossing your front teeth for a few days. If you decide to do more, fine, but build the habit slowly. If you are going to learn to play a musical instrument, don't start by saying that you will practice an hour a day. Begin with

fifteen minutes or ten or five and build your mental/ emotional muscle memory. The same is true of going to the gym. Just commit to going to the gym one, two or three days a week, and once you're there, maybe just do one exercise. The key is setting a new pattern.

I believe that the one habit that underlies all of the other habits is our spirituality. The gospel of Luke tells us that Jesus was in the habit of going to worship. He prayed before every major decision, and presumably before not so major ones that are not recorded in the bible. And speaking of prayer, this is basic. Start small. I've developed the habit of saying a prayer—silently—when I turn off my bedside lamp at night. Sometimes it is the Lord's Prayer. More often, it is the same one that my parents taught me, that I taught my children and say with my grandchildren. "Now I lay me down to sleep..." When it comes to worship, which is central to our life together and more importantly our spiritual development, start small; commit to attending worship once a month. Worship with a faith community that feeds your spirit. Don't follow a preacher but the One to whom the preacher points. Take a sabbatical from one faith community and visit another but don't neglect this aspect of your life.

The new things of a new year begin with our spiritual life. We will never be truly, eternally successful if we do not have deep spiritual roots. See you in church.

At the Lord's table we

Over the past three months I have been describing the individual components that comprise a Lord's Day Worship Service. The first section of the worship service is referred to as the <u>Gathering</u>. The second part of the service is called <u>The Word</u>. The final portion of the service is called <u>The Eucharist</u>. Within <u>The Eucharist</u> section there are several smaller parts.

The first part is the Offering. Essential to the Christian life is a willingness to offer one's self to God to be shaped, changed, empowered, and directed. Through the elements of each worship service, we witness the costly self-offering Jesus gave of himself so that we might be recipients of his righteousness. In response to what Jesus has first given us, we offer back to God our lives, our gifts, our abilities, and our material goods. Our offering is in response to Jesus' ultimate offering of his life for us, and so we "pass the plates" after hearing the Word, and offer our gifts to God. During the Offering music is often played or a testimony of a church member is given in celebration of God's graciousness, another way of offering our gifts (other than the money that goes in the plates) to God. Then, to conclude the Offering, a Prayer of Dedication is prayed devoting those gifts for the purposes of God.

Following the *Offering* is the *Invitation* to the Lord's Table. Since New Testament times, the Lord's Supper has been a regular part of the Christian worship service. This sacrament, The Lord's Supper/Eucharist (also referred to as Communion), was instituted by Jesus Christ on the same night he was betrayed by Judas. So even before church governments were formed, before creeds and confessions were ratified.

before the first word of the New Testament was written the Eucharist was firmly fixed as the heart of Christian faith and life. It is by the Lord's Supper, the bread and the wine, the words and the actions, that the promises of God are made visible and concrete. At the Lord's table the invisible gifts of God are made visible.

During the Eucharist, the church blesses God for all that God has done, is doing, and promises to do, and the church offers itself in obedient service to God's reign. It is helpful to think of this sacrament through three lens which converge. It is a feast of: remembrance, communion, and hope. When we come to the Lord's table we do so remembering that our Lord Jesus Christ was sent of the Father into the world to assume our flesh and blood, and to fulfill for us all obedience to the divine law. At the Lord's table we come to have communion with Christ who has promised to be with us always, even to the end of the world. In breaking of the bread. Jesus makes himself known to us as the true and heavenly bread that strengthens us unto life eternal. In the cup, Jesus comes as the Vine in whom we must abide. We believe we commune with Christ through Communion. We also come in hope, believing that the bread and the cup are a pledge and foretaste of the feast of love of which we shall partake when his kingdom has fully come.

After that prayer have been offered the next part of the worship service is the *Breaking of the Bread and Pouring of the Wine*. The bread is broken so that all who are gathered may see it done. The wine is poured into the cup in such a manner that everyone participating in the Lord's Supper may see it happen. In these actions we are reminded that Christ's body was actually broken for us and his blood was shed for us.

With the bread broken and the cup poured, the *Communion* of the *People* may commence. The means by which the bread is given and the cup passed may vary, but the point remains, they are the gifts for for the people of God. In them the invisible grace God gives becomes visible.

After the gifts of God for the people of God have been consumed, the *Thanksgiving* is offered. This prayer has been a central part of the sacrament from very early centuries in Christians worship. In this prayer we thank God for God's mighty acts in the past, present, and the future. The conclusion of this prayer usually ends with the entire church body saying, in voice, the Lord's Prayer

Next up is the *Sending*. In the *Sending*, we hear commitments to seek baptism, discipleship, and reaffirmation of faith. It is a time in the worship service when followers of Christ share their commitment to live into the call God has placed upon their lives. After that, a *Hymn* is usually sung. The *Hymn* is selected to reflect; thanksgiving, hope, remembrance, or communion, as well as our appreciation for God's generousness in our lives and our

aspiration to live as God has called us to live.

The very last pieces of the Lord's Day service are the *Charge* and *Blessing*. The *Charge* calls us to be God's agents, bringing healing to the brokenness that is pervasive in this world. In short, God calls the church to join the mission of Christ through service to the world. The *Blessing*, also known as the Benediction, is the last spoken words of the the worship service. They assure us of God's peace and that God's blessing has been given to us. Additionally, they give us confidence that God goes with us wherever we may go.

The structure of the Lord's Day Service has many parts to it, however, each part has been carefully thought out. Whether is seems like it or not, there is intention and purpose behind

each piece. I hope through these descriptions of the Lord's Day Worship Service, you have learned a bit more about the intentional structure, the purposes, and the reasons why we do the things we do.



Have you ever thought something worked one way, only to find it didn't? Like maybe as a kid you thought the bathtub drain was a death trap. Then you learned it couldn't actually suck you into the sewer and that was a game changer. Or maybe you were

sure that the closet should be avoided because monsters lived there. Then you learned they didn't. That changed your morning routine for sure. Any time you learn new information, it can turn your world upside down.

Jesus had a habit of doing just that with the people closest to Him. He often did or said things that were the exact opposite of what anyone expected. He'd take ideas that everyone agreed with, ideas that everyone would say, "Of course, that's just the way it is," and He'd flip them upside down. He would tell people to do the exact opposite of what they thought. This was especially true when Jesus talked about how we treat people, specifically people who like us, people who don't, and people we don't even notice.
